



Foundation English Test (FET):

The FET is a proficiency exam aimed at college level students to show the level and competency to complete a diploma program delivered in the English language.

This test is delivered, monitored and managed by the College of Excellence via a computer-based test (CBT). The FET replaced the Cambridge Preliminary English Test (PET) in 2019.

Difficulty level:

This test is designed for those who have an intermediate level of English B1.

- B1 is one of the CEFR levels described by the Council of Europe.
- B1 level means the ability to express oneself in a limited way in familiar situations and to deal in a general way with nonroutine information.

What is the FET test like?

There are four main sections for the FET:

Grading scale:

There are four scores that test takers can earn:

- 1. Pass = B1 / B1+
- 2. Progress to diploma = High A2
- 3. Fail = Low A2 or less

Everybody likes to feel that she or he is special. Sadly, many of us grow up believing that we're not special at all. We wish that we could be more attractive or better at sports. We wish we had more money or nicer clothes. Like the Tin Man, the Scarecrow, or the Cowardly Lion from The Wizard of Oz, we think we're not good enough just as we are. In the film, The Tin Man wishes he had a heart. The Scarecrow wishes that he had a brain, and the Lion wants courage. Eventually, each of them realizes that he already has what he wants. Nearly all parents want us to be the best we can be. They occasionally attempt to encourage us to do better by comparing us to others. They mean well, but the message we usually get is that we're not good enough. We start to believe that the only way we can be special is by being better than somebody else, but we are frequently disappointed. There will always be somebody out there that is better than we are at something. There are a lot of people around who may not be as intelligent as we are but who are better at sports. Or they may not be as handsome, but they have more money. It is unthinkable for us to be better than everybody else all the time.
